

#### Welcome from the Cathedral Dean

Welcome. It is such a joy to be able to invite you to celebrate Christmas with us. This is a difficult time for the world. There is terrible war in what we call the "Holy Land." There continues to be a senseless and brutal war in the Ukraine. There are rumors of ethnic cleansing in the Sudan. Governments are electing increasingly right-wing politicians. Dictators seem to be unchecked in their pursuit of power. Our challenge is how to welcome the Christ Child.

The birth of Jesus, in an occupied country — occupied by a brutal and authoritarian regime — is a light "shining in the darkness." He was born of a poor family, born amidst opprobrium for circumstances that could only be explained as somehow the will of God. He was born to a young woman who risked being stoned to death for becoming pregnant out of wedlock. Yet, she said, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." (Luke 1:38). The baby could have so easily been executed under the horrific decree of a jealous king called Herod. Herod had been visited by Magi (wise men) from the East who were looking for a recently born king. This unlikely birth is heralded as the **Incarnation.** God coming into the world as a baby, who, as an adult would bring salvation and deliverance.

"You, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High;
for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways,
to give knowledge of salvation to his people
in the forgiveness of their sins,
because of the tender mercy of our God,
whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high
to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death,
to guide our feet into the way of peace." (Luke 1:76-79)
So, according to the story, Jesus, born of Mary, enters the world. The
family became refugees in Egypt.

A few years on, after their return to Israel, Jesus is taken to the Temple in Jerusalem. He meets an old man called Simeon, who proclaims:

" ... my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel." (Luke 2:30-32)

Jesus is then met by Anna, an 84 year old widow. She, "began to give thanks to God and to speak of him to all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem." (Luke 2:38)

What is the significance? For those of us who are Christians this is the miracle of miracles. St. John sums it all up in his memorable words:

The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through him, yet the world did not know him. He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

(John 1:9-14)

It does take faith to accept the story. The story is retold each year around the world. The story is retold so that those who do not believe may perhaps catch a vision of God. God doing something extraordinary and inviting the people of the world to not just see the world differently but also to enter into God's vision for humanity. That vision is called the Kingdom of God.

Come and join us in our worship.

#### The Cathedral's Social Work Programs

**Student Support** assists young people who have had to abandon their studies for financial reasons, because illness in the family or loss of employment. We currently have 4 students: MP, finishing her psychology degree, DL in her last year as nursing technician, RR last year of psychology and EC studying his second year of medicine. We have other candidates and are always seeking more funding.

The Arpillera Project provides work for some 40 women and their families in Pamplona Alta, and has been going since 1997. It has made it possible for some families to buy plots of land build their houses, install their first proper bathrooms, and pay for their children's schooling or higher education. Most of their work is exported to the USA and the UK Check the Arpillera stall here at the Bazaar!

**Prison Ministry** Our Mama Lucha has been teaching handicrafts in the women's prison in Chorrillos for 43 years now, then selling their products. She also helps with the needs of the under-3s who live there with their mothers

Lucha will be selling their creations at the bazaar.

Christmas Bag project The annual project with donations from pupils and teachers of San Silvestre, whereby bags each containing a toy /game, school materials, toiletries and cookies or sweets are given to over 300 children in mainly rural areas. This year they will be sent to bilingual communities in Oxapampa, Apurimac, Abancay and Collique.

#### **Tabor - Praying in Silence**

Silence, prayer and mindfulness are increasingly important in our times, when we are all so hyper connected to information that we become less sensitive to listening, to being silent.

When somebody asks me what Tabor is, I stay silent for a moment before I explain that it is the place where I would have loved to be 2,023 years ago... It was on Mount Tabor that our Lord showed himself to his disciples transfigured in Light, to give them comfort and encourage them to endure the difficult moments of the Cross.

The three synoptic Gospels recount the Transfiguration (Matthew 17:1-8, Mark 9:2-8 and Luke 9:28-36).

That moment was so beautiful that Peter wanted to build three tents, one for Jesus, another each for Elijah and Moses, who manifested themselves in that powerful vision.

Contemplating that moment, I understood that it could be reproduced following the instructions that Christ our Lord gave to the disciples before he manifested himself in Light... he said Pray, pray.

Understanding the enormous power that prayer has, this is how Tabor's Praying Movement began at the Good Shepherd.

Join us in the Cathedral on Wednesday evenings at 6pm for an hour of silent prayer, to speak to God and above all to listen. A unique and calming experience.

# Wordsearch

Angels are very much part of the Christmas story, speaking with Zachariah, Mary, Joseph and the shepherds.

The well-known carol "Hark the herald angels sing" was written by Charles Wesley in 1739 to express the wonder of God incarnate coming to earth in order to reconcile with Him men and women, separated from Him by sin. A sombre man, he preferred solemn music, and envisioned the song being sung to the same tune as his hymn "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today".

A hundred years later, in 1840, Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) composed a cantata to commemorate Johann Gutenberg's invention of the printing press. English musician William H. Cummings adapted this music to fit the lyrics of "Hark the herald angels sing", and this is the tune usually sung today.

The underlined words from the carol may be found vertically, horizontally or diagonally, in any direction.

"Glory to the newborn King!
Peace on earth and mercy mild
God and sinners reconciled"
Joyful, all ye nations rise
Join the triumph of the skies
With the angelic host proclaim:
"Christ is born in Bethlehem"



# Is Rudolph the reindeer a – girl?!

Rudolph the reindeer may have a splendid bright red nose – but there is something else rather odd about him: he has antlers. And anyone who knows reindeer will tell you that Father Christmas's favourite reindeer for foggy nights cannot be male because only female reindeer have antlers at Christmas time.

Two professors at Edinburgh University have been looking into this problem. They found that female reindeer grow antlers in time for winter in order to dig in the snow to reach lichens and so provide food for their young. Males, on the other hand, grow antlers only in order to fight with other males during the mating season in the autumn. Once that is over, they cast their antlers away, well before Christmas.

So – who are the reindeers pulling Father Christmas's sleigh? We have always assumed that all those antlered reindeer were male. But perhaps this is not so.... perhaps we should rename Rudolph Rudolpha!





# Where did Christmas stockings come from?

No one is really sure, but a story is told of St Nicholas, a bishop who lived in the 4th century, who may have started the custom by accident. St Nicholas was of a wealthy family, and of a generous heart. As Christmas approached one year, he wanted to help a poor family whom he knew, but he did not want them to know it was him. So he climbed up on their roof on Christmas Eve and dropped some coins down the chimney.

The next morning the coins, to the great surprise of the family, were found in the stockings of the ladies, who had hung them to dry by the fire the night before. Every year after that they put their stockings out, in the hope that some more money would fall into them. They told the story of this amazing appearance to their friends and neighbours, and the custom caught on.
